Emma has a passion for extended voice and song form and shares teach's others individually and in group workshops.

JACQUI STOCKDALE | Visual Arts & Set Design

Jacqui Stockdale is a Melbourne based visual artist working across photography, painting, drawing, collage, installation, animation and performance. Known for her magical and often surreal portraits that explore cultural identity, masquerade and folkloric traditions.

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

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PROGRAM NOTE - Yumi Umiumare, Artistic Director

Driven by the anarchic form of Butoh, *Odd Hours* poses the personal yet urgent question: 'what is normal?' Especially in our current climate during these pandemic times, we've been urged to get back to 'normal' - even though we have forgotten what it means to be 'normal' anymore.

Working on this project with over 30-odd people, most of whom have never actually met each other before, has been far from 'normal' yet lots of fun! Pulling together the performers from different disciplines of differing ages between 20's to 60's, and putting them all on stage, in a very short amount of time, is not 'normal', but rewarding. Eating ice cream in the middle of the night is not normal, but exciting. Removing our security blanket of normalcy is challenging, but definitely liberating while forcing us to find a new way of living. *Odd Hours* is a testament to what can be achieved when under duress, of what can be born from a state of chaos.

Butoh, originally called *the Dance of Darkness*, has always been associated with the marginalised; embracing the abnormal, the odd, quirky and the deviant. This art-form has liberated us, giving us the marvelous permission to embrace our deep darkness, doubts and uncertainty during this strange and unusual time.

Odd Hours is a communal ritual, entering through a portal into a dreamscape which then opens more gateways into other strange and surreal spaces. It is a celebration of hope for us...that we may embrace our 'new ab-normality', so that we can transform into a new wholistic being......or at least discover what is possible!

As an old Japanese proverb says; "We are all fools if we dance or not, so we might as well all dance!" We invite audience members to be a part of that dance, either internally or externally, in order to seek and celebrate our New Ab-normality. Enjoy!
